Women's Work Quilt Exhibit, Featuring First Achievers with guest Tori McClure, support grant from the Ky. Oral History Commission

The Oldham County History Center has received a \$1,200 grant for collecting oral histories of women of Oldham County who were "the first" to break the gender barrier in various jobs and positions. The grant is a companion to the Women's Work quilt exhibit by artist Rebekka Seigel. Seigel's quilts emphasize famous women of the 20th century and made a brief visit to the Oldham County History Center in 2007.

The quilts highlight the careers of women such as Ella Fitzgerald, Eleanor Roosevelt, Lucille Ball, Rachel Carson and Pearl Buck. Each quilt was designed to emphasize the clothing and style of the women during particular highlights of their careers—thus the quilts are in "paper doll fashion" as the outfits can be placed on a figure of the person that is highlighted. Jan Jasper, educator at the

history center, wrote a grant to the Ky. Oral History Commission to collect local oral histories of local women achievers. Over 12 oral histories will be taken and featured as a part of the exhibit.

In addition, the Oldham County History Center will host Tori Murden McClure as the featured speaker for a reception to honor Oldham County's women achievers. McClure was the first person to row solo across the Atlantic Ocean.

The reception and Murden's talk will be on Saturday, March 21 at Noon at the Oldham County History Center. Tickets are FREE but must be obtained in advanced. Author and Native E. Bruce Heilman Featured Speaker For the January Dinner Meeting of the Oldham County Historical Society.

Local native, Dr. E. Bruce Heilman will be a guest speaker for the dinner meeting of the Oldham County Historical Society. Dr. Heilman, will recount his life experiences that are featured in his new biography, *An Interruption that Lasted a Lifetime: My First Eighty Years*. Born and raised in Oldham County, Heilman served in the Marine Corps in WWII. He pursued a career in higher education and was president of two colleges including the University of Richmond from 1971 to 1986 where he is currently Chancellor. To mark his 82nd birthday, Heilman rode his Harley-Davidson motorcycle across the United States. He and his wife, Betty, have been married for 60 years.

Celebrating 50 Years 1959-2009 Oldham County Historical Society

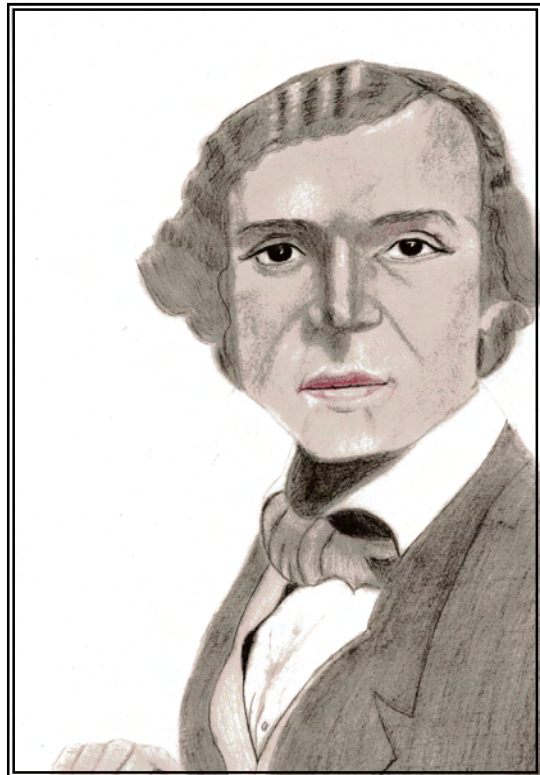
The Oldham County Historical Society kicks off 2009 with the celebration of its golden anniversary. The first organization meeting of the Oldham County Historical Society was held on Tuesday evening, October 6, 1959 at the Duncan Memorial Chapel in Floydsburg, with 50 persons in attendance and Mr. R. F. Johnson serving as temporary chairman. Over the years the Society has continued and grown, raising the awareness of community history by preserving, collecting and conveying the stories of the people and events that have shaped its development. Today the Society has expanded its mission and manages the Oldham County History Center which includes an archives, collections and museum.

The Oldham County Historical Society is celebrating its Golden Anniversary through special programs and exhibits throughout the year. The new exhibits include a **D. W. Griffith Mini-Theatre** supported by the Peyton Samuel Head Trust, **Trisha's Attic** supported by the Trish Garlock Memorial Fund and a new, hands-on technology area that includes artifacts from the past. The Society will also host the **Between Fences**, a Smithsonian Traveling Exhibit from April 25 through June 6. The public is invited to join in for a "Paint a Picket" fence contest. A section of picket fence will be available to paint for participants, who can chose a historic theme or event that celebrates the Oldham County Historical Society's 50th Anniversary.

Other special events for the year include a world premiere play funded by the Ky. Arts Council to debut at Actor's Theatre, May 29, 30 and 31. The play, **Voice of a Fugitive**, was written by Carridder Jones, expressively for the Oldham County Historical Society and details the life and times of local native, slave, fugitive and newspaper editor, Henry Bibb. The Society also received a grant through the Lincoln Bicentennial Celebration from the Ky. Heritage Council. The grant expands the current archaeological programs for two summer Archaeological Institutes for High School students at the Gatewood archaeological site during the Sum-

mer of 2009 with increased public archaeological programs on site in the Spring and Fall. This site was the last place where Henry Bibb was a slave before his flight for freedom to Canada. From April 15 to August 15 there will be a special exhibit, **The Henry Bibb Project** that focuses on the archaeological program and the slave culture of Oldham County.

The Society will wrap up its' fifty year celebration in the Fall 2009 with a special exhibit, **Primary Docs: The Museum Collection**. It will feature some of the rare and unique documents from the archives that include letters, court records, deeds, diaries, architectural drawings and other personal correspondences.

Oldham County History Center receives \$14,720 Grant for Archaeological Work from the Ky. Heritage Council in Honor of the Lincoln Bicentennial Celebration

The Oldham County History Center is very pleased to announce this grant award which will help continue fund the important archaeological programs at the Gatewood site in Trimble County. This site was the last place where Henry Bibb was a slave before his final escape to freedom where he became the first black editor of a Canadian newspaper.

In 2002 the history center began this archaeological program with money with a start-up grant from the Ky. Heritage Council. The hope is to place the site on a National Park Service Trail that traces Bibb's life journey from Kentucky through New Orleans, Pennsylvania, New York, Michigan and Canada. Bibb was one of the major leaders of the Separatists Movements prior to the Civil War. He raised money to establish a Refugee's Colony in Canada for slaves.

Since 2002 the Oldham County History Center has hosted numerous, public archaeological programs on site with the permission and cooperation of the site owner, Colonel Glenn Fisher. The grant will expand more public digs during 2009, sponsor 2 summer institutes for high school students and allow for professional archaeological cataloging of artifacts that have been collected on site.

Trisha's Attic Exhibit to Open Valentine's Day, Saturday Feb. 14, 2009

Trisha's Attic will open on Feb 14, featuring textiles, costumes and other vintage clothing from the history center collection. The exhibit was created from memorial gifts dedicated in honor of Trish Garlock, former owner of The Treasured Child on Main Street in LaGrange.

Trish was well known for her love of history and in particular vintage clothing. The exhibit displays the some of the museum's special collections and includes a dress up area and hands on activities for children. A ongoing film discusses fashion trends and special patents of the 20th Century.

**D.W. Griffith Mini-Theatre
Opens Jan. 22, 2009
With Grant from the Peyton
Samuel Head Trust**

The Oldham County History Center received a grant from the Peyton Samuel Head Family Trust to develop a mini-theatre that honors Oldham County native, D.W. Griffith. Often called the father of modern film, Griffith was the first movie director to develop feature length films. His first film, *Birth of a Nation*, lasted 131 minutes and delighted moviegoers, who, up until that time, had only experienced the short films, usually lasting only 10 to 15 minutes. *Birth of a Nation* was a very controversial film because of Griffith's portrayal of the Ku Klux Klan in a heroic role. It sparked riots in the streets and litigation in the courts. As a work of art, it was flawless; applying cinematic conventions to audiences who were moved as never before.

After *Birth of a Nation*, Griffith went on to produce other tantamount films with storylines that explored controversial topics such as drug addiction, child abuse and multiracial relationships. He brought filmmaking from a novelty status to its enduring place as a barometer of American culture.

The D. Griffith Mini-Theatre will open on D.W. Griffith's birthday which was January 22, 1875. The history center houses a library of Griffith films and plans to show them, ongoing and by request, at the Oldham County History Center. There will be birthday cake and popcorn to celebrate the opening.
